1949 Scholarships Information

The Notre Dame Club of the St. Joseph Valley, composed of alumni of Notre Dame residing in the South Bend area, makes available this year a full scholarship and a partial scholarship to the University. Any male senior student or graduate of a high school in St. Joseph County, Indiana, is eligible to apply for these scholarships and is invited to do so.

The following regulations regarding the scholarships are among those in force:

1. The scholarships shall be held for a maximum of eight semesters which, except in special circumstances, must be completed within four years.

2. The scholarship holders shall be men of high worth and exceptional intellectual ability who have given decided evidence of their capacity to profit from a college education.

3. The scholarship holders shall be men who could not, without financial assistance, attend the University.

4. The scholarship holders shall be "day students" in the University.

5. The club's full scholarship shall amount to \$250 per semester.

The club's partial scholarship shall amount to \$110 per semester.

Regulations Concerning Application for 1949 Scholarships.

It is necessary that students submit with this application:

1. A list of all high school grades and credits to date, certified by the high school principal to be correct.

2. Letters of recommendation from the high school principal and from two other responsible persons not related to the applicant and related to the applicant and residents of St. Joseph County, both of whom have known him for the past five years or more.

3. A recent small photograph of himself.

The application must be in the hands of Mr. Paul M. Butler, Room 301, Odd Fellows Bldg., South Bend, not later than May 14, 1949. Any additional information about the applications can be secured from any member of the Scholarship Committee. The Registrar of the University will be pleased to supply upon request a current bulletin giving information as to credit requirements, courses, etc. at Notre Dame. Much of this information can also be secured from the Notre Dame literature which is probably on file in the schools.

Track Season in Full Swing

The Washington track team has already participated in four meets this season. One was an indoor conference meet; the others were a dual and two triangular meets.

In the indoor meet, they placed seventh with 7 1/5 points. In the dual meet they lost to Washington-Clay 55-54. They won one triangular, in which they met New Carlisle and Woodrow Wilson. In that one they earned 54 1/2 points to New Carlisle's 50 and Wilson's 30 1/2. They lost in the meet with Mishawaka (64) and Riley (41), winning 28 points.

Still remaining on their schedule are nine meets, two duals, two triangulars, and twin city meet, conference trials, conference finals, sectional meet and state meet.

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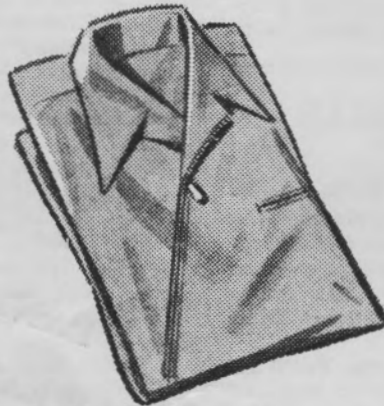
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
