## Summer School Plans Announced

Summer School classes for South Bend junior and senior high school pupils will be held in Central High School for academic subjects and in all four high schools for music, according to an announcement made May 4. Students expecting to attend must have indicated their elections on or before May 20, when election blanks for them must be sent to the superintendent's office. No pupil will be admitted unless he has had filed an election blank signed by both principal and counselor.

There will be no tuition charge for grades nine through twelve. However, there will be a \$2.00 book and instructional supply fee. This is payable the first week of the summer session. Since the state does not reimburse the city for expenses for grades seven and eight, pupils in those grades must pay a fee of \$12.00. This includes the book and supply fee.

All students who live outside the city must pay a fee of \$12.00, which includes the \$2.00 book and supply fee.

Mr. Robinson and the Washington Social Living Class members who assisted in the making of a survey of the educational needs of the Harrison Junior High School district have received a letter of thanks from Mr. M. L. Perkins, principal of the Harrison School.

### Landuit in Regional Sprint

John Landuit, Washington High School track star, qualified for the regional track meet last Friday, May 13. The regional meet will be held in East Chicago on Saturday May 21. Landuit qualified by placing first in the 100 yard and 220 yard dashes and tying for third in the high jump. He withdrew from his third place in the high jump, however, so that another competitor could qualify.

Landuit is known as one of the city's best sprinters. He has proved himself by consistently defeating Len Kowalski of Central and many other good runners. In the sectionals he beat Kowalski again in the 220. Kowalski came in second.

Besides his great performances in all the track meets he has participated in, Landuit has broken the school record of points earned by an individual in one season. In the sectional meet he earned all the eleven points credited to the team.

If Landuit places in the regional, he will qualify for the state. His withdrawal from the competition in the high jump last Saturday earned him applause from the crowd and respect from all his competitors. Both recognized it as the act of a real sportsman.

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
