The following Tuesday we face the veteran line-up of the John Adams Eagles. After John Adams, we oppose another veteran team on Thursday. This time it is Madison Township's Panthers. All three of these games are to be played in the Adams gym.

As for the strength of our opponents, it looks like all of them are going to be tough. Above all, the county teams should not be sold short. Madison has an all-veteran line-up, but they lack height. New Carlisle has but one man left from last year's first five, Jim Agness, who forms the nucleus of this year's team, but they have played several games already. As for our second opponent, Adams, it looks like they are going to be plenty strong this year. They have three of last year's regulars, including Joe Howell, Don Truex, and Dick Truex.

Our team is not going to be a push-over for anybody, either. This year's team cannot help being better than last year's team. The team is going to be big but for the most part inexperienced. Much of the responsibility for scoring the points and taking the ball off the backboard will rest on the shoulders of DePaepe. Probably no one on the team is as full of fight as McGowan. As for our center, it looks like no one can beat out Strozewski and the forwards look like DePaepe and Reynolds Mejer. The next choice for a forward spot will probably be Pete Smith.
