The Recent Elections

Most students of Washington H. S. "exercised their suffrage rights" in the recent class elections. After the "smoke and fire of political oratory" had subsided, one observer noted the following:

"Charges and counter-charges" were hurled by the followers of the various candidates. The opponents of Candidate A contended that his "political platform was vague," that he was "controlled by a political boss," that he was guilty of "sponsoring pork-barrel legislation," and that through "his henchmen" he had promised "a political plum" to almost half the electorate.

The supporters of Candidate A denied these accusations and charged that Candidate B was guilty of "party machine politics" and "violations of the Hatch Act", "straddling," and had "resorted to mud sling-ing and last minute lies."

One candidate was accused of having "a large slush fund" and favoring the use of the "spoils system," while another was labelled "a peanut politician" and as being in favor of "the 'yellow dog' contract." One person said that he had been "besmirched and besmeared with the grime and the mire of political corruption" and would never again be a candidate.

Most of the winning candidates received only a majority vote but a few posted substantial pluralities. E.N.R.

To Combat TB

Junior Board Tours Healthwin

The Junior Board of the Tuberculosis League met at Healthwin Hospital on Wednesday, October 11, for a tour of the sanatorium. The purpose ot the tour was to acquaint the board members with the methods and equipment used in combating TB.

The Junior TB Board consists of two representatives from each senior high school in St. Joseph County: a senior and a junior. If the school is co-educational, a girl and a boy. The senior representative is Eleanore Taberski 12B of Home Room 203.

It was an interesting and educational experience to go on this tour. The board members met in the sanatorium's auditorium. The auditorium was furnished hv former Healthwin patients. It is equipped with a small stage, an' address system, and portable chairs. There is also a television set. The symbol o the Potowatomie Indians covers the drapes, for it was in the Potowatomie Park that the first TB stand was established.

The tour of the hospital consisted of seeing the laboratory, X-Ray room, conference room, class rooms, watch repair and radio repair rooms. Patients who are in-terested in finishing high school may do so at Healthwin. There is now a patient who is only four credits away from becoming the first student to complete all his high school work at Healthwin.

The hospital library, called the Woodson S. Carlisle Memorial Library, was furnished by the Mary Ann Club of the Studebaker Corporation.

The new Observation Ward containing the newest equipment is not yet open due to the shortage of nurses. It was interesting to note that Room 149 was furnished by the Junior TB Board.

Each member of the TB Board has a pen pal at Healthwin. Eleanore Taberski has as her pen pal Londa Wharton, an attractive dark haired, eighteen year old girl. Joan Bejma of South Bend Catholic and Joanna Harter of Washington-Clay also have Londa as a pen pal. The members were allowed to see their pen pals. Looking Up Washington Beats Adams, 32 - 6

After ambling through two victories and three defeats, The Washington football team exploded into something resembling real Panther character last Saturday night, to defeat the Adams' Eagles, 32 to 6. The team even managed to make three touchdowns in ten minutes to make the victory convincing. The scores were made by Ganser on a plunge from the one-yard line, Miller on a similar play, Cashaw on a twenty-yard sweep around right end, and Gilkey and Robertson on passes caught from Miller. The Adams' score was set up by a blocked punt. The game hints that football may be "looking up" at Washington.

Until last Saturday, the football record is nothing to brag about. The boys got off to a slow and unfamiliar start when on September 15 they met Central Catholic of Fort Wayne and took a 27-6 drubbing. The Panthers were tame cats, indeed, that night, rather than the slick, fighting animals whose name they claim. Members of the coaching staff, student body, and public were not happy with the appearance of the squad, particularly with its lack of fight.

Stinging from the remarks of friend and foe alike, the squad went into the Mishawaka game with somewhat greater life and fire. However, they faced a foe in top-notch form and inspired by the knowledge that for the first time they had a chance to "take" the Panthers. Against the kind of skill and fight the Maroons were able to muster, the Panthers did not have enough and fell, 13 to 6. Their followers took some encouragement from the fact that they did show some improvement.

On Friday, September 22, the team got into the winning column by defeating the Goshen Redskins, 12-6.


