Will You Be My Valentine?

February 14 is one of the special days of the year, which has been observed by the sending of gifts, especially by young people, since the fourteenth century and probably earlier.

Several explanations are given for the familiar customs of sending love tokens and greeting cards; and for various social activities connected with Saint Valentine's Day.

Its origin is uncertain, but three traditions try to account for it. One calls it a survival of an old Roman February feast called the "Lupercalia." Young Romans put into a box the names of young maidens and then drew the names, by chance, for partners. A second refers to the rural tradition that "about this time of the year birds choose their mates, and probably then came the custom of young men and maidens choosing valentines or special loving friends on that day." The third is based on the stories about a certain Valentine of early Roman days, who has become the patron saint of the day. Some say this Saint Valentine was accustomed to go around from house to house leaving food on the doorsteps of the poor; and that the custom of sending Valentine greetings developed from that fact.

The sending of sentimental valentines and gifts of flowers and candy on February 14 has fallen into disuse in Great Britain, but is still common in America.

The State Scholarships enabling a student to go to Ball State Teachers College, Indiana State Teachers College, Indiana University, and Purdue University; the N. D. Club of St. Joseph Valley scholarship to boys of St. Joseph County; a nursing scholarship offered to girls to the Memorial Hospital School of Nursing, the School Men's Wives' scholarship to physically handicapped students. There is also the National Scholarship Fund for Negro students. If you're not ready to go on campus, Indiana University Center offers a chance to do extension work at the center.

Finances are not as hopeless as they once may have seemed. A Washington student who was graduated last year is now attending Kalamazoo College; another is attending Purdue. Poster Contest Announced

Calling all artists!! Hey all you people who like to doodle. Here and now is your chance to do something with that gift of yours. The 1951 Health Poster Contest, sponsored by the St. Joseph County Tuberculosis League, is now underway. All students are eligible to participate. You don't have to be taking art in school to enter. The subject is "How My Community Fights Tuberculosis." Sub-topic suggestions: through education, tuberculin tests, X-Ray surveys, tuberculosis clinics, sanatorium care, rehabilitations, etc. The size of the poster is to be 16" x 22". Posters may be made at home or at school. Inks, water colors, oils, or any other media with either pen or brush may be used. Only one poster may be submitted by each student. The following information must appear on the back of the poster in the lower hand corner: name of student, his school, grade, and post office address. (Do not sign on the front.) All posters must be in the Tuberculosis Office not later than Monday, March 12, 1951.

Prizes totaling \$45 will be awarded. First prize is \$30; \$20 contributed by the South Bend Art Association and \$10 contributed by the Tuberculosis League. Second Prize is \$10. Third Prize is \$5. All posters made by students other than seniors will compete for a scholarship of one semester of night classes at the South Bend Art Association. All posters made by senior students will be sent to Indianapolis to compete in a statewide contest for a full year's scholarship to John Herron Art School.

Panthers Snare Two in Five

Washington's Panthers, trailing for most of the game, spurted for sixteen points in the final quarter to down the Goshen Redskins 60-57 in a conference game played on the Goshen floor on January 19. Willie Gilkey was the Panthers' key man, hitting for twenty-six points, six in the last period. Jim Finch followed with twelve and Robertson had eight.

Meeting in a conference game, the Central Bears nipped the Panthers 48-47 in the John Adams gym on January 23, Washington led at the half but in the third quarter the Panther attack sagged and Central drove up. With forty seconds to go Tom Landen's free throw did the final damage, giving the Bears their victory.

Gilkey made sixteen and Robertson had seventeen for the Panthers. Jensen tossed in eleven for the Bears.

Washington blasted the Bremen Lions 62-36 in a non-conference game on the opponents' home floor on January 25, two nights after the heart-breaker with Central. The Panther reserves played most of the third and fourth quarters and even that was too much for the Lions.

In another conference game, the Panthers were taken by Adams, 48-46, in the Adams gym on February 1. Adams held a ten-point margin throughout the game, only to see it narrowed down to two at the final gun.

Three players, Don Oakes of Adams and Gilkey and Robertson shared scoring honors with twelve points each.

Burris High of Muncie proved to be too much for the Washington boys in the second half of their game at Muncie on February 3, and they downed the Panthers 51-40.

Phy Ed Teachers Get Training

Washington is participating in the final training of two Indiana University students preparing to be physical education teachers. Sam Winston completed his "practice teaching" in the Washington gymnasium last Tuesday. Winston, a Central graduate and all-round athlete, was assigned to Washington to obtain experience in high school physical education and to Linden for elementary school experience. He now returns to the Indiana campus for completion of his university training.

This semester, Casimer Witucki, graduate of Washington in the class of 1946, will be assigned to Washington. Witucki was captain and guard on the 1945 team which lost only to Riley and was tied by Muncie Central, So. Bend Central, and Whiting, while winning five games.
