# Greg Sutton Acquitted!

## W.H.S. YOUTH TRIED IN MOCK COURT

Recently, the flavor of the court room reached Washington High taking the form of a mock trial held in Mr. John Simala's first hour Problems in Democracy Class.

Presiding over the mock trial which tried Greg Sutton for misuse of county funds was Judge Jerry Lukavich.

Defending Mr. Sutton were the defense attorney, Steven Gable and his assistant, Brian Dampier. In order to prove his client's innocence, Mr. Gable called two witnesses. George Nicholas played the role of a county commissioner and Robert Peterson, the role of the defendant's personal financier.

Later Mr. Peterson's testimony was stricken from the record and he was charged with perjury. This charge was based on written proof from The New York Stock Exchange that the stated closing price of Xerox Stock during the month of August 1965 (stated by Peterson to be 94 7-8) was incorrect.

Mark Botos played the prosecuting attorney, aided by his assistants, Doug Smith and Shelli Williamson.

The prosecution called as witnesses Charles Weaver, a county auditor, Tom Prymak, a private investigator, who previously held the post of county auditor and Jerry Soley, president of Dixie Construction & Supply Company.

Recording the proceedings was the court recorder, Carolyn Hojny.

The jury numbered nine: Pat Brown, Tom Dyszkiewicz, Diane Fletcher, Ken Jaszinski, Cindy Kasznia, Colin Pence, Terry Pullman, Al Suppinger, and Elaine Zimpleman.
