In September of 1947, Mr. Andre Bohannon entered what is now known as Lulu V. Kline School as a kindergartner. At that time it was Washington Elementary School and had a total enrollment of 600 pupils in the 13 grades. As he progressed along through his school career, the school became more crowded and each grade he left was then eliminated and sent to a grade school in the

"Peanut Gallery

All the assemblies they attended were held in the audi torium. The younger children of the school sat in the balcony, later nicknamed the "peanut gallery" by Mr. Mc-Namara. Often the younger ones were kidded and sent on wild goose chases by the upperclassmen but everyone realized that it was all in fun and regarded the older students as their big brothers and sisters.

King Pins

In 1955 when Mr. Bohannon's class finally reached the high school level, they considered themselves the "King Pins," however they were actually still the lowliest in the school for now the school had become Washington High School. The grades ranged from nine to twelve. Throughout his 4 years of high school his class was kept together. His homeroom was 126 and Mrs. Pagin, their "friend and mother" was his home-room teacher.

Graduated in '59

Mr. Bohannon's class contributed greatly to Washington both academically and athletically. In June of 1959 he graduated along with eleven others-the last to attend Washington for the entire thirteen years of their school-

Some of Mr. Bohannon's fellow students are here now such as Mr. Forrest and Mr. Solmos. When Mr. Bohannon returned to teach at W.H.S. he found little change except the building. He found the school traditions and fine school spirit being carried on as always.

With Our Own Mr. Hoffman In Russia

On June the eighth, Washington High School's Russian language teacher, Mr. Jerome Hoffman, arrived in the Soviet Union to begin a ten week's summer study at Moscow University.

Mr. Hoffman was one of the 25 Russian teachers in the United States to be chosen for this summer seminar.

The program consisted of 3 hours of class work each week with six hours each week day and four hours on Saturday. The subject matter dealt with advanced Russian grammar, conversation, and literature, the geography and history of the Soviet Union, and the background of the Russian educational and political systems. Frequently, expeditions were organized to introduce students to the museums, theatres, and other areas of local Soviet culture.

Throughout the summer, Mr. Hoffman became well acquainted with the inhabitants of Moscow, and on August the 26th he returned to the United States with a broader understanding of Soviet living.

In addition to supplementing his Russian language skills, the Moscow summer se-
