## PANTHERS GAIN STATE RANKING WITH 7-3 RECORD

The Washington Panther Basketball team, led by Benny Lindsey's scoring and Recie Bethel's ball handling, have earned an impressive seven won, three lost record and a position in the top 20 of Indiana.

Sophomore Lindsey has tallied 182 points thus far, which is a better than 18 points average per game, which is good enough for second best in the city.

Co-captain Bethel is the second highest scorer on the Panther team, scoring 92 markers in the 10 games completed, but this isn't his best attribute. Recie is the stand-out dribbler, free throw sharpshooter and passer for Coach Nowicki, and is leading the squad in assists.

An interesting point is the Panther state ranking. It's been a long time since a Washington basketball team has received state recognition and this year's marvels have broken the ice. The WHS men are 19th in the State, which is tremendous when you realize there are 639 teams competing in Indiana High School Basketball. Most of the eyes of sports fans in Indiana were opened by the Panther victory over Central in the Washington Holiday Tourney, but the roundballers have been per-

forming just as well throughout the campaign.

The West Side Club owns victories over Hammond Noll, East Chicago Roosevelt, Hammond Clark, Washington-Clay, the championship battle over Central, and two triumphs over Riley. The setbacks the group have suffered were to Ft. Wayne North (6 points), St. Joe (3 points and overtime), and the Penn Kingsmen, which shows the Panther desire for victory.

Scoring wise, the Panthers are led by Lindsey with Bethel next. The rest of the hard court performers are well balanced in scoring averages; Bob Bloss and Jim Forray average close to seven points, with co-captain Sol Townsend, Willie Middlebrook, and George Johnson sporting averages near six.

Tonight it's the Washington Panthers visiting the Caveman of Mishawaka, who were also in the state's top 20 and possess the areas top scorer, Dick Witkowski. The 25th of January the Panthers travel to Goshen and battle the Redskins of Goshen, who are rated one of the States best and last week were 10-1. February finds the Panthers meeting the No. 1 team Michigan City and those Bears from Central.

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## SKILLS IN TAKING EXAMINATIONS

There is more to getting high test grades than merely knowing the subject matter. High grades are based upon whatever you manage to show on the test paper, not on what you know. Yet, test grades are the most vital school commodity. Make high grades and you are a success; make low grades and you are in trouble right now!

Too often students fail through lack of skill in taking tests rather than because of a lack of study. It is of no avail for you to know the subject matter if you cannot prove that you know by means of written tests.

Many students feel this pressure and report that the very thought of tests makes them nervous and jittery. They feel that they do their poorest work on tests. Now, here is a sure cure for these test jitters; enter the classroom with your mind filled with a plan of action. Fears creep into idle minds. So fill your thinking space with positive plans for taking the test and there will be no room left for anxiety.

As soon as you get a look at the list of questions, make out a tentative time budget. This is action, and action is an enemy of fear. Now start with one question, the first one. Read the question so carefully that you are sure you understand what it says. Answer the first question. Now dismiss this question from your mind. (This is a real key to success in test

## MR. FILL INTERVIEWS TOP OFFICIALS

Recently senior government classes saw video tapes of Mr. John J. Fill's interview with Indiana Governor Matthew B. Welsh. Over Christmas vacation Governor Welsh granted Mr. Fill an interviewing during which they discussed pressing financial problems in Indiana and methods of solving them. The Governor's message to the American government students was heard over video tape during the week of January 14 to 19.

Mr. Fill also interviewed the newly elected United States Senator Birch Bayh and United States Representative John Brademas. Mr. Brademas and Mr. Bayh discussed the things a student should gain from a course in American government.

## DISCORDANT NOTES

By the time a person becomes a senior, he has developed many shortcuts to aid him in his studies. But unless this valuable information is passed on it is of no use to anyone after the senior graduates. Therefore, in order to smooth the way for the scores of underclassmen who must otherwise find these things out for themselves, here is a student's guide which will prove to be of infinite value.

### Guide to Subjects

You will find that none of the subjects are too hard or too easy. You must get to know your subject, however, and know what is expected of you. For example, in shop class, you might learn how to make a boomerang. In physical education class, you will learn how to throw one. Math class will teach you how to figure how far your boomerang will go and how many degrees there will be in the angle it makes. History class will teach you about the first people to ever make boomerangs, and finally, physics will teach you why your boomerang will not come back.

### Guide to Teachers

To make the most of your classes, you must get to know the teachers and get to know just what each of them expects, and what it takes to get a good grade. The most important factor in getting along with a teacher is to remember that a teacher likes to know that you are trying. (And some students are trying!) You must show some skill in the subject, and must show that you are interested in learning the right way. For example, a teacher is likely to become rather peeved after a boy has managed to

get tangled up in his compass string for 17 days in a row.

### Guide to Fellow Students

Another important factor in getting along at school is your ability to get along with your fellow classmates. Most of these students can be classified easily enough, and will fit into one of the following categories:

1. The "twister" — he is the one who cannot sit still for more than 37 seconds at a time. Invariably he sits in front of you, making it impossible for you to see the board or the teacher without craning your neck or sitting in the aisle. You must sympathize with him, for his actions may be attributed to the fact that his mother over-starched his corduroys.

2. The "twitch" — this type must rub his ear, scratch his head, clean his glasses, or bite his fingernails an average of 13 times per class hour.

3. The "snob" — although this student appears to take little notice of any-one under 6'7" because his nose is always tilted skyward, he isn't actually a snob. He just has a sinus condition and chronically forgets his handkerchief.

4. Miss Priss — this is the real fooler. You get the feeling that there has never been a stray hair on her head, or a stray thought in her mind, for she is always immaculate and composed. 5. The skyscraper — this is the tall, skinny, sleepy-eyed boy who looks like he couldn't move one foot in front of the other without knocking down three people. But wait until the first basketball game — he's up and down the court, scoring, dribbling, leading the team to victory.

## Guide to Classroom Procedure

One thing that must be kept is the rule which states that a pass must be secured before a student may leave his room during classtime. The proper procedure is as follows: request a pass from the teacher in charge of the room in which you are present. If your excuse is urgent enough, or if you mumble lowly and clutch your throat, gasping and wheezing, you will probably be given a pass. taking. If you keep worrying about any question as you read the next questions, you will probably miss them.)

Read the second question. Give it your full attention, and answer it. Now forget it and turn your thoughts to the third question. This method of using their entire thinking space in planned action has helped many students to avoid mental tensions during tests. At least, entering the room with a plan and putting it into immediate action gets you off to a good start.

However, students have reported that right in the midst of an exam, without warning, something happens to cause a partial or complete blackout of knowledge. As a result, the last part of the exam is left out or is very poorly done. Sometimes they have just noticed the time and a fear of not finishing the test drives out constructive thoughts. Sometimes an unfamiliar problem will start the wrong train of thought.

The only remedy is to stop trying to work, relax your muscle, take three or four quick deep breaths, and make a fresh start with a new plan. Remind yourself: "I am going to read the next problem carefully. I am going to give it my full attention. I am going to meet the problems of this test one at a time." Then go right ahead, read the question, and keep your mind busy with the job at hand. You see, you cannot banish thoughts, but you can think the thoughts you decide to think!

This plan has proved successful with student after student.

with a novel situation. This is one of the few places where you will be asked to sort out the false from the true. Most statements you meet as a student, in textbooks and the like, are true. We become accustomed to reading statements as true. This means that you must use extreme care in the reading of each individual statement. Be sure that you know what it says.

There are usually a big number of questions. No one question can, therefore, be of too great importance. Answer a question to the best of your knowledge and then forget it. You must dismiss each question from your mind in turn. Any carry-over of anxiety will hurt your chances of answering the following questions correctly.

Having passed from question to question, giving your full attention, right down to the end of the test, you may have time to run through part or all of the test a second time. If you do this in the same manner that you did the first time, it has been found that doubts will creep into your thoughts and you will make the questions with a new approach, you will probably raise your grade. Go through the second time asking yourself: "What was said about this in class?" or "What did the instructor say about this item?" You may read several questions before such thinking recalls new information. Changes made under this condition have proved to be consistently from wrong answers to right answers.

Multiple-tests are tricky. The questions and responses are so worded that should you make one mistake in reading you will be led to the wrong response.
