NATIONAL **BROTHERHOOD WEEK** "Democracy at Work"

"Brotherhood is democracy at work-Believe it! Live it! Support it!"

For the thirtieth consecutive year, the National Conference of Christians and Jews is sponsoring National Brotherhood Week, February 17-24, 1963 celebrated by 10,000 communities across the nation. President John F. Kennedy, Honorary Chairman of Brotherhood Week, has stated, "Human brotherhood is not just a goal; it is a condition upon which our way of life depends."

Surely it would seem a bit hypocritical to assume that the sole purpose of the celebration of National Brotherhood Week was to recaptrue the image of living democracy for one 7-day interval, only to disregard the practice for another 51 weeks of our daily lives.

On the contrary, NCCJ's main objective in sponsoring National Brotherhood Week is simply to pin-point one week out of the year as a vivid reminder to those of us who tend to disregard the individual right of our fellow citizens.

National Brotherhood Week emphasizes (more clearly) the prime worth of the individual despite his race, color, creed, or nationality - the same principle of freedom and equality which is the very cornerstone of democracy. Certainly, if we are to live in peace and harmony with one another, these belifs must become a part of our daily lives.

Information on National Merit Qualification Test

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test is a threehour test of educational development prepared especially for the National Merit Scholarship Program by Science Research Associates. It provides test scores in five Areas, a Composite Score, and a Selection Score. The emphasis of the test is on broad intellectual skills; the questions measure what you can do with what you have learned rather than merely how many facts you know. The NMSQT consists of five separately timed tests — Engish Usage, Mathematics Usage, Social Stu-dies Reading, Natural Sciences Reading, and Word Usage.

SOME FACTS ABOUT PARTICIPATION

How do I apply?

Students receive consideration for Merit Scholarships by taking the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. Since taking the test constitutes a request for consideration, no other application is necessary.

Who is Eligible to Participate?

Students who plan to complete their high school work in 1964 and enter college the same calendar year are eligible for the scholarships to be awarded in the ninth annual program. Generally, these students are second-semester juniors or first semester seniors, but all students who are eligible may take the 1963 NMSQT regardless of their high school classification.

Who Should Take the Test?

Students who believe they may benefit from the services and activities of the Merit Program are invited to participate by taking the NMSQT.

Remember, if you do register to take the test, you should make every effort to carry through by actually taking it. Arrangements for testing are based on your expressed desire to participate.

Note:

Negro students taking the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test may, if they wish, avail themselves of the college advisory services of the National Scholarship Service and Fund for Negro Students (NSSFNS, 6 East 82nd Street, New York 28, N.Y.) and compete for NSSFNS supplementary financial aid, in addition to being considered for Merit Scholarships

The NMSQT will be administered in each secondary school that registers for the test.

Who will administer the test?

The test will be administered by your principal or by his designated representative.

When will the test be administered?

The test administration date is Saturday, March 9, 1963. How much will the test cost?

The fee for taking the test is \$1.50. Unless otherwise specified by your principal, you should pay this fee on the testing day. If you are unable to pay, and your principal has strongly urged you to take the examination, ask him to write directly to the National Merit Scholarship Corporation for permission to test you without charge.

When will scores be reported?

In May your school will receive an individual report of your five subtest scores, your selection (total) score, and your composite average score. Your principal will also receive interpretive material that can be used as an aid in explaining the meaning and significance of your scores.

Every candidate for admission to Saint Mary's College is required to attain a satisfactory score on the Scholastic Aptitude test administered by the College Entrance Examination Board. Three Achievement tests must also be taken for placement purposes.

These tests are to be taken in: 1. English; 2. a foreign language; and 3. mathematics or social studies or a science. It is recommended that the Scholastic Aptitude test be taken early in the senior year and that Achievement tests be taken in March of the senior year.

Sol Townsend, in one of his finest performances, riddled the Bear defenders for ten points, and Willie Middlebrook and George Johnson offerred two basketball necessities, great rebounding and brilliant defense along with 2 and 3 points respectively.

On February 2, at Benton Harbor, the Washington team was stunned by defeat, 89-70, and the South Bend fans were stunned by no seats. Meeting Benton Harbor meant the Panthers were playing Michigan's finest quintet. The Tigers deserved their rating, but could have been beaten. The Panthers were in the state rivalry contest until a lapse in the third quarter, which proved disastrous. Trailing most of the game by six to ten points, the Panthers finally felt the pressure and got careless. As the Panthers eased up, the Tigers opened up and built up a huge 25 point lead, midway in the final stanza. Washington put on a late press, but 25 points are a little too many, and the final margin ended up at 19, 89-70. This was the highest total against Washington this season and the second highest point production by the Panthers, 75 against East Chicago is high.

In defeat, the Panthers displayed a balanced scoring attack with Bethel tops at 21. Recie was followed by Lindsey and Townsend, who scored 11 points, then by Bloss with 10 markers. Middlebrook followed with nine and Gillen closed the scoring with 8.
