EVANSVILLE ALL-CITY ORCHESTRA AND BAND ENTERTAIN W.H.S. STUDENT BODY

The Evansville Public Schools All-City High School Orchestra and Band recently entertained the Washington student body in the first Evansville concert to be presented to South Bend students. South Bend city school superintendent, Alex Jardine, acted as master of ceremonies.

The orchestra opened the program with an instrumental prelude by William Walton and then a lively "Jamaican Rhumba" by Arthur Benjamin. A seventeenth century number, "Gavotte," was the topic for a bass violin solo by Lynn Peters.

The first portion of the concert was concluded by selections from Cole Porter's "Can-Can." A combo, consisting of an All-City guitarist, Dennis Gillon on the trumpet, Terry Hill on the drums, Bill Boots playing the saxophone, and R. J. Snider on the bass violin, entertained the audience during a brief intermission.

The All-City Band, led by Harry Hart, played a novelty number, "Fume and Swing" in the style of Benny Goodman. The audience also heard impressive selections from "Mutiny on the Bounty." The "Fiftieth Anniversary Song" by John Phillip Sousa completed the program.

Included in the instrumental music program of Evansville led by Mr. Claude Smith, are students from Evansville's Bosse, Central, North, Harrison, and Reitz High Schools.

Bill Goebel, a trumpeteer from Reitz High School told HATCHET reporters that he has been with Evansville All-City for the past three years of his high school career.

Bob Carpenter and Tom Black, Evansville Central students, play the clarinet and saxophone respectively. This is Bob's first and Tom's third year of membership with All-City.

Mark Schuasaus of Reitz High School has played the drums for six years and is now a two-year member of All-City.

Shannon Lamb and Jane Schmadel, who both attend Bosse High School, play the clarinet and the cello respectively. Susan Sumner, a clarinetist for six years, is now a one-year All-City member. Donna Sharp of North High, has been a musician in elementary and high school All-City for five years.

Senior violinist Della Simpson is a Bosse High School student and an All-City Band and Orchestra member for four consecutive years.

THE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The National Honor Society is a nation-wide organization which has local chapters, and honors the outstanding students in the country. The members are chosen by a faculty committee on the basis of scholarship, leadership, character, and their service to the school. Juniors and seniors who have a three point average (B) are candidates, and the faculty committee studies these persons to see if they measure up in the other qualities besides scholastic ability. For instance, persons who may have the three point average, but have never joined any clubs or shown an interest in school and class activities are eliminated because they cannot qualify up in leadership and service.

When the faculty is considering a student, they may ask themselves such questions as:

Is this student always thoughtful and courteous?

How is his behavior during class and in the halls?

Is this student honest in his school work?

Is he respected by both the faculty and his classmates?

One must put forth an effort to be in the National Honor Society, but one does receive many benefits. Those organizations which award scholarships usually ask if a person is in the National Honor Society. If he is, his chances of receiving the scholarship are increased. Organizations which award scholarships look especially for students who take an active interest in various school activities, join school clubs, and are active in either the school's yearbook or newspaper.

The new members are introduced into the society at an assembly to which their parents are invited without their son or daughter knowing it. The society holds monthly meetings at which there are guest speakers or special programs. Pat Wojnarski

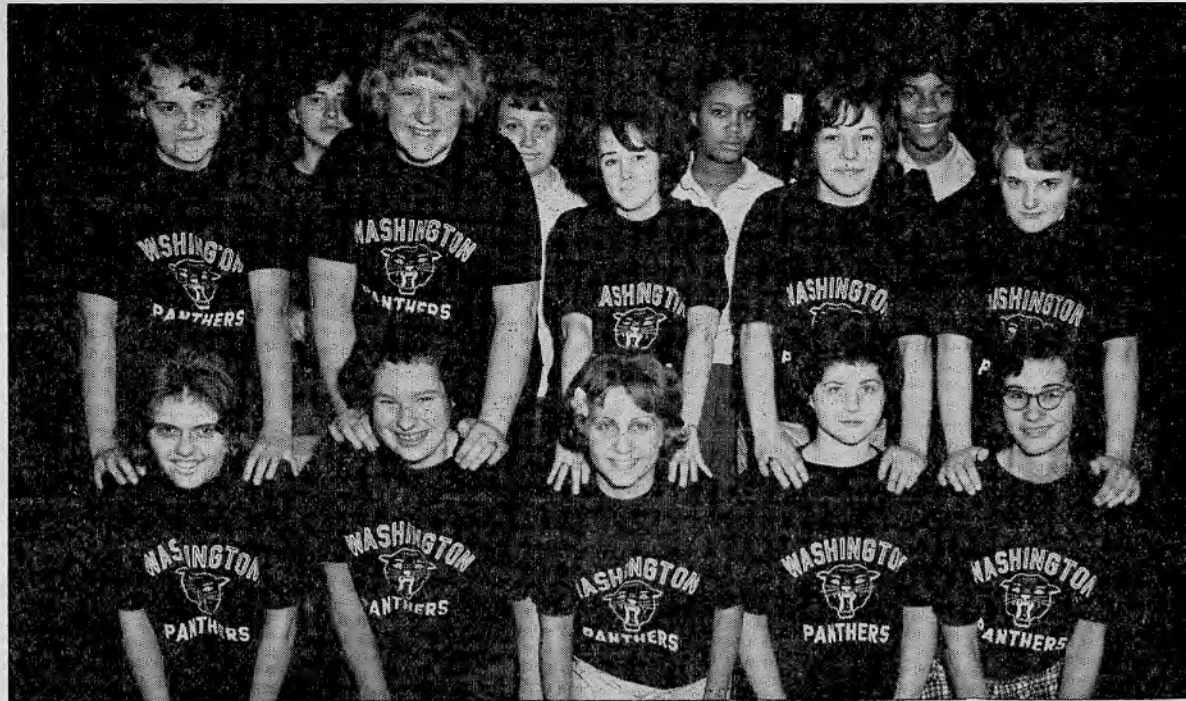
