In this country, 1,700 daily and 9,000 weekly newspapers are published. A few miles off the coast of Florida, a government controls the presses. The largest difference between the lives of the communists and the West is the free press.

Newspapers provide up-to-the minute reports, entertainment, and advertisements. These publications are constantly trying to improve themselves to serve the public better day after day.


From a lady's point of view, this column will unravel the mysteries of the sports world from a feminine standpoint. Team Spirit Bites Girls, Too.
