The other events are 200 yd. medley relay, 200 yd. freestyle, 50 yd. freestyle, 200 yd. individual medley, diving, 100 yd. butterfly, 100 yd. freestyle, 100 yd. back stroke, 400 yd. freestyle, 100 yd. breaststroke, and the 400 yd. freestyle relay.
