Things did not turn out as good for the girls' basketball team as they ended their season with 0 wins and 11 losses Ann Dodd received the Kiwanis award.

All that is left in the sportsworld now is baseball, golf, and tennis. Everything looks pretty good for the baseball team even though they got off to a slow start. They seem to have jumped back on their feet now and started going. Golf and tennis look good too as they have many people returning from last year.




## Ricky Szymanowski Gets IUSB Scholarship




