

Senior chats with Clinton during summer 'working vacation'

Meeting the President is a once-ina-lifetime experience. Senior Richard Green had the chance this past summer to go to Washington, D.C., and meet President Clinton. The path to the President began with his selection to Boys' State.

Green was chosen to Boys' State because he demonstrated outstanding leadership at WHS and had an understanding of how the government works. Boys' State of Indiana is held in Terre Haute.

Students from all over Indiana were chosen to attend this conference. They learned how Indiana government functions and attended a session of the Indiana Congress.

All the students wanted to be chosen to go to Washington, but only two would have the chance. The list of candidates was eventually narrowed down to eight and then to four. When the cut was made to four, Green thought for sure that he was not going to make it and was ready to pack up and come back to South Bend.

The Boys' State director chose Green for an Outstanding Citizenship award. Then the students voted to send one of the candidates to Washington. Much to Green's surprise, he was elected to go.

Once in Washington, all the fun ended. Two boys from each state (Hawaii was not represented) attended. They were asked to hold mock Congress sessions and to create and pass a bill.

Green's bill, was to have bike lanes built next to all major highways. To assist in correctly writing this bill, Green had help from Democratic Congressman Tim Roemer. Green's bill, however, was defeated because it was too complicated to be put on the Senate floor. Also there was a lack of interest in this bill compared to gays in the military, the health-care issue, or abortion.

The schedule was hectic all five days. Congressional sessions left little time for much else. Sightseeing had to be done in the evening after "work." Green said, "I saw just about everything from the Washington Monument to the Lincoln Memorial."

Finally, the big day arrived. Days of playing Congressman ended, and it was time for what they had all come to Washington, D.C., to do—meet the President.

"It was a long, hot sticky day," Green recalled, "We all sat in one of the gardens waiting for President Clinton to arrive. When he finally did, I was struck by how tall he was."

Each boy was given the opportunity to speak individually with the President. During that time Green told the President what a great honor it was to meet him. The President then asked how Indiana was doing. Green replied, "It is coming along fine." In other remarks to the President, Green said he would be free to cut Clinton's hair. Clinton chuckled and replied no.

"After your five minutes were up this lady pushed you along," Green said. "I guess she was supposed to keep him on schedule."

After speaking with each delegate individually, President Clinton spoke to the delegation. Clinton, himself, was a Boys' State Representative who had the

opportunity to meet with President John F. Kennedy. Clinton joked with the group by saying that if any of them has his picture taken with the President, maybe in 30 years he will end up in the White House.

The speech went on to talk about the issues, including the health-care system and how his generation has forced the country into a hole. He expressed an urgent desire in his speech to fix the problems of the country including drugs, illiteracy, and the deficit. "But before anyone was ready for him to go, that woman who had been around came and whisked him off," Green said. "He said he would be back but he never did."

"The best part of the trip was meeting the President," Green recalled. "I did also meet Vice President Gore."

Flying back to South Bend after such an exciting summer and starting back to school must be so dull. But just as young Clinton met with President Kennedy, maybe one day it will be President Green.

Probable cause warrants locker searches

But how does that apply to high-school students in the United States? Basically, it means that administrators

can search a students's locker only if they have reasonable suspicion that the student is hiding a dangerous weapon or drugs.

"If one student reports to an administrator that another student has a gun, that is considered probable cause," according to WHS principal David Kaser.

Webster's dictionary defines probable cause as "apparent or presumable reason or motive."

In large cities such as New York and Chicago, metal detectors have been placed at entrances, and random locker searches are common. In Detroit, school officials recovered 70 firearms form September to January in random locker searches.

A little closer to home

in Indianapolis, 17 firearms were found in one school system from September to January 1991.

In making it safer for the students, locker searches have become an effective tool to find guns and drugs.

But is it legal?

The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) agrees that it is legal.

Searching student lockers is not only legal, but in some states courts ruled that the lockers are the school's property and students are just allowed to use them.

Kaser said,"The lockers belong to the school, and if we think that the safety of students is in danger, we want to prevent a serious accident."

Some students disagree: "I think that it is wrong to search students' lockers. The school gives them to us to use, and they are ours for the four years that we are at

WHS," sophomore Michelle Rodriguez said,

"It violates the students rights," senior Todd Young added.

Is searching really fair to the students? The ACLU says, "Don't put any accusing item in the locker to avoid a search."

The searches can be done without the students' prior knowledge, but usually the student is present. At WHS random searches are not done but it is not uncommon in large or particularly dangerous school systems.

"If they have an absolute reason, they should be allowed. But the student should be present when it is happening," sophomore Nick Koscis said.

"Wouldn't you feel safer knowing that if a student had a gun all you would have to do is tell a school official? Then the guncould be taken away and no harm done," sophomore Amy Wiseman said.

If a student kills another at school, and the principal had prior knowledge of the gun and did not confiscate it, he/she is liable for damages.

I don't want my locker searched, but if it helps make the school safer, then maybe it is not all bad, is a common opinion voiced among the students.

The Issue: Child Support

FACT: Nearly 1.2 million American couples divorced in 1990; about half of those involved children under the age of 18. (Channel One Teacher's Guide, Nov.-Dec. 1993)
FACT: The Census Bureau reports that only half of the four million families due child support in 1983 got the full amount, and a quarter received nothing. (U.S. News and World Report,

Dec. 1, 1986)

FACT: By 1994 all states are supposed to garnish paychecks automatically, without waiting for the paying parent to become a delinquent. (Newsweek, May 4, 1992)
FACT: New laws that force delinquent parents to fork over more money which pays for better schooling, housing and medical care for the children and their guardian. (U.S. News and World Report, Oct. 12, 1987)

No one has right to take money out of paycheck

Divorced parents have a lot more to worry about these days than just who gets the car, the house, the dog, and, oh yes, the kids. With tougher laws enforcing the payment of child support, a new kind of battle may be brewing, a battle over who gets custody of the children. Both parents want to be the legal guardian of these children, so that they won't have to pay child support.

The threat of having a paycheck garnished is opening the eyes of more and more divorcing parents. The new laws state that the absent parent must pay child support on time, or they will face having the money they owe taken out

of their weekly wages.

This law can be good. Getting a runaway mother/father where it hurts (the wallet) can produce a satisfactory feeling. Now, turn the coin over. Everyone has bills, just as everyone has problems. Picture a young man, recently divorced, with two small children whom his ex-wife cares for. She will not let him see his children, but she wants support. The young man has had trouble finding a job, but finally finds one. Although the pay is very little, his wife wants money. Now comes the sad part. The government takes the money he owes before he even sees it. It's an outrage! The mother has bills, but so does this man. Where does he get his break from?

'Most fathers aren't deadbeats; they just don't know how to budget," says Merrily Burch, who prosecutes delinquent parents in Madison, Wisconsin. "For the father who's mistakenly giving priority to his car payments, withholding money from his paycheck has made a tremendous difference in his lifestyle. He can't spend what he doesn't see, and he can't live on what he doesn't have,"

(U.S. News and World Report, Dec. 1, 1986).

Some fathers make so little money that their child-support payments feel like an enormous burden. Payments are usually based on a percentage of parental income, however, even wealthy fathers can feel the pinch.

The government can exaggerate child support claims a little too much some times. For instance, Washington, D.C. lawyer, Grier Raclin pays \$4,150 a month to his ex-wife Victoria Reggie, who is a well-paid Washington lawyer who is about to marry Senator Edward M. Kennedy, (Newsweek, May 4, 1992). Why would a well-paid woman, who is going to marry a very well-paid man need that much child support? Child support should only be paid if the guardian is in need of that money.

True, taking care of the children is both parents' responsibility. In 1991 the government said that they took more than \$619 million from the income tax refunds of parents delinquent in child-support payments (Jet, Nov. 1991).

This makes more sense than just taking the money directly out of paychecks. The burden would be less heavy if the payment was removed from only one month rather than from the tax return money many people count on to pay for unforseen debits. Some fathers need their entire check to survive from week to week. Those who get paid every other week may feel the pinch even harder than other paying parents

According to INC./April 1993, the Montgomery County Support Agency, in Ohio, ordered a delinquent father's employers to pay all the child support its

employee owed; the total was over \$2,500.

The courts really stretch the limit when they force a company to pay all of the child support of one of their employers. Employers should not be forced to pay for their workers' negligence. Instead of shifting the burden from the responsible one's (the parent's) shoulders, the paying parent should be helped. Lessons in budgeting money and responsibilities could be helpful. This way wages would not have to be garnisheed, and the parent could profit from the

The child-support laws have caused a higher payment, sometimes of 10 percent or more, for parents required by divorce courts to pay support, (Money, Aug. 1990). As if the absent parent wasn't paying enough, now he is paying even more; some of this money goes to pay lawyer and court fees.

Dad must support his children

Proper care is not being given to the children in this country. The story is always the same. Dad leaves mom, and mom is stuck trying to support herself and the children. Dad promises to pay child support. Mom waits patiently for the checks to arrive. Month after month the postman brings bills, but no checks to pay for them. During these months, momand the children plunge into poverty while dad has nothing to worry about.

This situation cannot continue. Something must be done...but what? The solution is easier than one may think. Grab dad's paycheck before he receives it

and take out a suitable amount of money to support his children.

Dads complain that if they pay child support, they have no money to support themselves. But, one can't forget that mom has to support herself and the children. Dad doesn't need to give up the entire paycheck, but he can't be allowed to neglect his children.

An extremely high amount of "deadbeat" dads exist in the United States. According to Newsweek magazine, only 18 percent of fathers pay their child support. In many of these cases, the dads are paying only because they have a court order that forces them to pay. This leaves six million women and children

without child support (Newsweek, June 21, 1993).

Many dads escape paying child support out of their paychecks because they constantly move from job to job. This makes it almost impossible to track them down. In order to prevent this from happening, by 1994 all states will require job applicants to provide their social security number. Also, employers will have the right to automatically take money for child support out of their employees' checks. These measures will prevent fathers from escaping their responsibility to their children (Newsweek, May 4, 1992).

The state of Wisconsin has the right idea when it comes to making unemployed, "deadbeat" dads pay up. They have a program called "Children First." This program gives dads a choice. They can either do community service, orgotojail. The community service does not pay, but it does put the dads through classes that teach job training, job searching, or parental responsibility. Some dads think that they don't have to do any of these things and will never end up in jail. This is not true. In just one week, eight men in Racine, Wisconsin, were sitting in jail because they refused to cooperate.

This program works very well. The number of child support payers has increased by 83 percent and the amount paid by 237 percent (Newsweek, June

21,1993).

Grand Rapids, Michigan, has a job search program that is also working. During an eight-month period in 1992, this program helped 432 out of 1,077 dads find good paying jobs. The payment of child support went up by over 300 percent (Newsweek, May 4, 1992).

Instead of forcing taxpayers to support the children of "deadbeat" dads, make the fathers take care of their own kids. What a novel idea, huh?





After receiving a wake-up call, the boys' basketball team is back on track. The Panthers were shocked in their opener with Gary Lew Wallace.

The team had put the practice gear away and packed their bags for their first game. The long bus ride and the unfamiliarity of the offense contributed to the flatness of the team. Wallace took advantage of WHS's 37 turnovers to beat the Panthers by 19 points.

"We went in expecting to win, and the loss was like an alarm clock waking us up for the rest of the season," said junior Mike Makowski.

Coach Milt Cooper, still looking for his first victory, fired up the team for their meeting with St. Joe in the South Bend Shootout at the Notre Dame Joyce ACC. The two teams played a close, evenly-matched game for three quarters. At the start of the fourth quarter, St. Joe led 46-42.

The Panthers outscored the Indians 14-8 in the first seven minutes of the quarter to take a 56-54 lead. With a minute to play, St. Joe's Matt Lesher drained a three-pointer and St. Joe regained the lead by one point. Then Jackson and senior Shawn Lee scored back-to-back buckets to give WHS their first win of the year,

60-57.

Jackson shined again by scoring 26 points and snatching 10 rebounds. Jackson performed with the game on the line by scoring 11 fourth-quarter points. Both Cooper and St. Joe coach John Skinner were impressed by Jackson's play. "Kodell is a man in a kid's game," Cooper said. "He was there when we needed him."

Skinner stated, "It was rough in there; we didn't have anyone who could be physical with Jackson."

It wasn't just a one-man show, however, as WHS shot 42 percent from the field. While Ward added 10 points and Lee scored 8, senior Brian Outlaw put 9 points through the hoop.

The JV is also 1-1, after having Gary Lew Wallace steal a win from them in the fourth quarter. The Panthers led by 10 points at halftime, but ended up losing by three points. The JV rebounded to beat St. Joe by two points on the road.

Both the JV and varsity have to travel to Elkhart's North Side Gym to play their next opponent, Elkhart Memorial, on Dec. 17.



Costner portrays an escape convict (Butch) who had an uncommitted




Butch's downfall is his concern for the treatment of children. He beats up
